

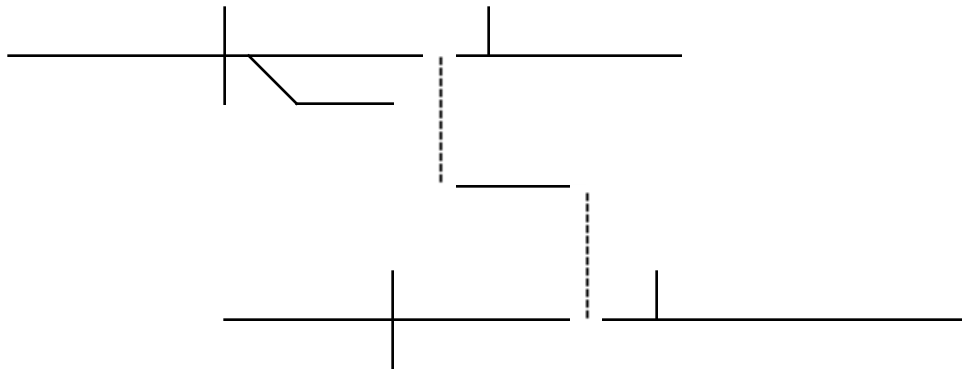
# Sentence Diagramming

## Lesson 10 - Compound Sentences

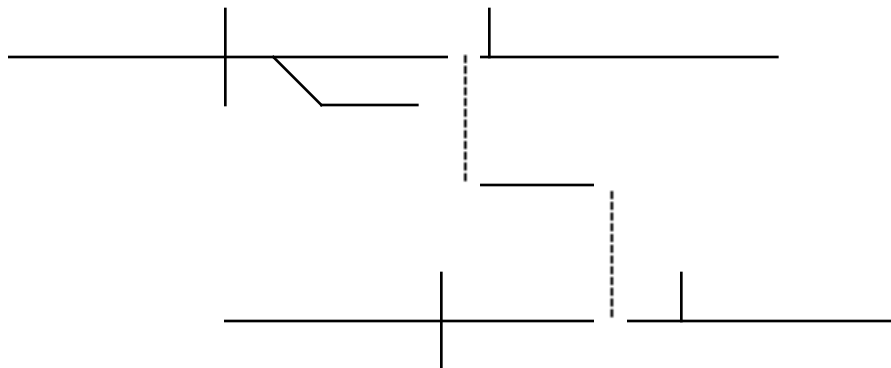

Compound sentences are really just two simple sentences that are joined together by a conjunction (and, but, or, so) or a semicolon. The two simple sentences are diagrammed separately, one over the other. They are then joined by a dotted line as shown in the example. The conjunction (or the semicolon) is placed on the horizontal line between the two simple sentences.

Example 1: The fantastic waiter gave me a menu, and the wonderful chef cooked my food.



Example 2: Give me my baseball, or I will tell my mother.
