

# Sentence Diagraming

## Lesson 13 - Review

**ADJECTIVES** - Recall that adjectives are words that describe nouns. They answer the questions “Which one?” “How many?” and “What kind?” A group of very common adjectives is the group of **ARTICLES**. An adjective is diagramed on a slanted line coming down from the word it modifies, or describes.

### Adjective Examples

What Kind? - red, thin, strong, intelligent, swampy, Canadian  
Which one(s)?- that, most, his, my  
How many? - three, few, many  
Articles - the, a, an

**ADVERBS** - Recall that adverbs are words that describe verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs. They describe **HOW**, **WHEN**, **WHERE**, or **TO WHAT EXTENT** something is done. An adverb is diagramed like an adjective - on a slanted line coming down from the word it modifies.

### Some Adverb Examples

How something was done - quickly, quietly, rudely  
When something was done - then, now, later, today  
Where something was done - there, here, somewhere, inside, outside  
To what extent something was done - very, extremely
